
St. Timothy History By Fr. Rick Bolte

Volunteering?

To whom does the church belong? The human leadership structure is well known; pope, bishop, priest. But this leadership is skeletal. It is the average person who is part of the parish community that puts flesh on those bones and makes the church real. The experience of community as well as the face of the church to the larger community depends so much on the members of the parish.

I suspect that the larger the church community, the easier it is to assume that "someone else will do it." This pertains both to how we minister to each other as members of the parish as well as how we reach out in concern for disadvantaged people in the larger community. In our recent series of teaching Masses, we were reminded that one of the most powerful moments of the church's liturgy is near the end when usually the deacon states the Mass is ended and sends us forth to be Christ's presence in the world.

So why do we hesitate to volunteer? It isn't that the tasks are so difficult or take a lot of time. I suspect we just "don't get around to it." (Reminds me when my dad was involved in the American Legion, they had round coins with the word "toit" written on them.) Sometimes too I think we are hesitant to commit because something else may come up that we'd rather do.

The sad outcome is that those who don't volunteer do not have a sense of ownership or pride about their parish. They often don't have the sense that we are about God's work in our world. They miss the joy that comes from giving of ourselves simply as a gift to others.

As the New Year begins, lets each step up to do the ministry Christ sends us to do each week. There is something for everyone to do if we open our hearts to the love Christ has given us to share.

View from the Pew

By now we are well into the Christmas Season and looking ahead to the new year. The new year is often a time for reflection on the way our lives have been and resolutions about how our lives ought to be. I have a few thoughts on some things you might like to try.

Keep a gratitude journal. We all have things for which to be grateful. Get into the habit of writing down 3 or 4 items each day in your journal. Don't overlook the small things like finding something you have been looking for or running into a friend you haven't seen in a long time. God is always working in our lives in big and small ways. Pay attention and be thankful. It is nice to read through your journal from time to time and remember God's goodness.

Get in the habit of a regular prayer time. Set aside a period of time to spend with God. I recently heard a speaker who suggested that each morning you sit on the side of the bed for 3 minutes and be silent in God's Presence. Ask God for a particular gift to give away that day, like patience or listening or compassion. A prayer that I have recently used is the Surrender Prayer. It is a novena with the refrain "O Jesus I surrender myself to You, take care of

everything". It is comforting to turn everything over to God. Think about how you might build in some prayer time.

Pray for others. I cannot tell you how much it means to me when people stop me and say they are praying for me. It does my heart good. There are different ways to approach this. Make a list, make a prayer bowl containing the names of those for whom you pray, pulling out a name each day for a special prayer. One person I know has a prayer board with little hooks on it. She places tags with names on the hooks as a reminder to pray for those people.

Find ways to help others. Do an outreach project here at church. Visit someone who is unable to get out much. Do a random act of kindness. Open a door for someone. Be creative. The possibilities are endless.

Finally, recognize the effect you have on others. Every loving act you perform, every kindness you extend to others is a reflection of Christ's Presence. You have the ability, dare I say the responsibility, to make the world a better place. Let's work on this together. Happy New Year.

Starting in October 2023, Fr. Rick and Fr. Michael incorporated into 5 separate Masses, a teaching session about the Mass.





K of C Coat Drive



We held a coat drive to collect gently used and new coats to be distributed to people in need throughout the fall and early winter season. We collected and received a large number of coats! Under the direction of Al and Bonnie Kovacic, they distributed 239

coats to the children in our Angel Giving Tree; 201 for SVdP clients and 38 to Gallatin County clients. Be Concerned received 20 coats and 100 coats were given to SVdP in Crescent Springs for their coat drive. The balance



has been given to clients new to our area who are in need. In addition, they received cash gifts to purchase coats totaling \$5610. Thank you St. Timothy Parish for helping our Knights care for our neighbors in need!

2 Grants Speakers

We hosted 2 nonprofit agencies, **PIN Ministry** and **Emergency Shelter of NKY**, who came to speak at our Masses in October and November. They were both recipients of our grant award.

PIN Ministry will use their funds to purchase needed supplies to help the homeless. St. Timothy held a collection and then packed 150 blessing bags to be distributed to our area homeless neighbors. Thank you to everyone who donated to the agency. Also, thank you to the 80 people who came out to pack the bags and make sandwiches.

Emergency Shelter of NKY will use the funds to purchase a system to connect their overnight clients with area professionals: doctors, VA, Housing opportunities, Federal agencies, Social Security, etc. We will be cooking a meal in January to help feed the 80 guests who will be staying the evening. Date is yet to be determined.

PIN Ministry

150 Blessings bags and 250 PBJ's were delivered to PIN Ministry in November. Thank you to everyone who donated items, who came out to sort and pack the blessing bags and make the sandwiches. Also, thanks to Lois and Bill Anderson for delivering the items. I have been told these were welcomed gifts to the people Pin Ministry serves.

Trip will include 4 or 5 star hotels in downtown areas, transportation with luxury bus, all breakfast and dinners, guided tours, and daily Mass.


