What's it Mean Today to be a Priest By Fr. Rick Bolte

Things were different when I was ordained (it will be 40 years in June of next year!). Though the Second Vatican Council had happened over a decade before I began training for the priesthood, we were still sorting out what it meant and how it would affect our ministry as priests. Change is hard and we knew it would be difficult at times for some parishioners to accept. Before my time, there was already a decline in the number of vocations. We expected that we would have greater responsibility and work more with staff and volunteers than priests had in the past. Priests were still held in rather high esteem (the abuse issue had not yet surfaced) and we talked more about avoiding clericalism: clerics using their status for their own benefit.

Today much of Vatican II is accepted. Most people like being able to understand the prayers at Mass, the ability of lay people to participate in Mass and other parish ministries, and appreciate the greater depth of scriptural understanding beyond the literal meaning. The priest shortage has gotten worse and priests are becoming pastors with less time as an associate and staffs are larger as lay parishioners do more of the parish work. Priests are not as automatically esteemed in public since the scandal but even in the midst of and since the crisis, people still greatly value the parish priest they know.

Nonetheless, the fundamentals of why one would choose to be a priest have not really changed. It is a ministry – "Ministry is service to others, and specifically NOT authority over others within the church. A "minister" is a servant -- it's what the word means in the Greek: according to Microsoft Bing Dictionary.

The most basic ministry is celebrating the Eucharist. This has to be the center of a priest's life. To celebrate day after day the extent of the love and mercy of God never gets old or boring. It's how a priest and any other minister orients their life. I can't imagine where my relationship with God would be without it. This sacrament and all the sacraments help bridge that connection between the priest and all he ministers to. In some ways, he is part of everyone's family celebrating births and weddings, being there in times when forgiveness is needed and when one is passing from this world to the next. Like everyone, a priest's life can sometimes be lonely. Though our relationship with Christ is central to our lives, the gift of the parish family is a great gift to a priest. I know I have been gifted by so many of you here at St. Timothy!

A priest's ministry can vary a great deal as well. A priest prepares liturgies, administers parishes and schools or diocesan organizations, teaches in high schools and universities, does outreach ministry, works in hospitals, etc. Though every priest has to do some of each of these, each priest has their own gifts and interests. I have found that usually there are volunteers in the parish who very ably fill in what is missing in a priest's abilities — as in decorating/designing for me.

Many things vary from time to time, place to place, and priest to priest. Facing the unknown future is part of everyone's life. As a priest one can expect to learn humility and evermore dependence on God as you face the surprises (happy and sad) that are part of the ministry. I can tell you

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
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that to be priest is a great joy and very rewarding! Though it is not easy and there are times you can feel overwhelmed (not unique to the priesthood), I can say for me it was the greatest gift I have ever received.

able to answer any questions you may have. I encourage anyone to consider a vocation to the priesthood or religious life. I would ask parents, grandparents, family and friends to encourage one another to consider a vocation to the priesthood or religious life. Any gift of ourselves that we offer to God is rewarded beyond our expectations!

Advent is upon us, a time of waiting, preparing and anticipating. What kind of a "wait-er" are you? I have spent a good bit of time these last few months waiting—for test results, for blood work, for a call from the doctor on where we go next. Sometimes I am a patient wait-er and at other times I am very impatient. I suggest that, during Advent, each of us work on our patience. The Old Testament peoples waited for hundreds of years for the coming of the Messiah and learned patience as a result. Where could you be more patient—in the checkout line at Kroger, with the driver in front of you who is not going as fast as you might like (it might be me, so be nice) with the server at the restaurant who is stressed because the restaurant is understaffed? How about practicing patience at home with your spouse and your children? The opportunities to practice patience are abundant. Think about it.

Advent is also a time of preparation, preparing ourselves for the gift of the Incarnation. Arrange a little extra prayer time using the Advent booklets given out at church or some other resource like Matthew Kelly's Best Advent Ever, available daily on video. Receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Read the Sunday readings ahead of time so you are familiar with them before you hear them at church. Watch Bishop Barron's

Sunday Sermon for additional insight into the scripture. Be generous with your resources—offer your time, talent and treasure to benefit others. Resolve right now to be a better person by Christmas Day.

Finally, Advent is a time of anticipation. I looked ahead at the Advent readings. The first two weeks are about anticipating the Second Coming of Christ. I have often said be prepared for you know not the day, nor the hour. This was really brought home to me when a friend was killed in the wrong way crash on I-75 a few weeks ago.

She was on her way to join a bus trip with other senior citizens for a bit of fun and went home to Jesus instead. The readings of the last two weeks are anticipating the birth of Jesus, something we look forward to with wonder and gratefulness.

May you have a blessed and holy Advent filled with patient waiting, holy preparation and joyful anticipation of the Birth of our Savior.






















Play and Praise

On October 24th we held a baby shower to support CareNet, Madonna House, Rose Garden Mission and New Hope.







The produce was distributed to Rose Garden Mission who serve 500 families every day and City Heights who served 250 Families. We ended our year with an evening of delicious food, great conversation and awards. Fr. Ruschman, 93 years old, was our honored guest. He shares how the garden was given its name. He loved gardening, so instead

SVDP: You Are Invited

"One who is gracious to a poor man lends to the Lord, And He will repay him for his good deed." Proverbs 19:17

The Society of St. Vincent de Paul is much more than a charity. Volunteers are dedicated to a holier life through charitable works. The spiritual development of our members (always a work in progress) is based, not only on delivering material goods – food, clothing, gas cards, rent money, beds, and furniture— to our neighbors, but also on gently inviting those we help to advance their own spiritual development.

In 1877, SVDP President - General Adolphe Baudon, wrote: "It is laid down in our Rule, ..., that in uniting to serve our masters the poor, as St. Vincent de Paul expresses it, our object is not only to relieve material misery, a very laudable purpose in itself, but to aspire, especially, through the practice of that most sublime of virtues "charity" to render ourselves better and more fervent Christians, and to make our poor enter on the same path, if we have the happiness of succeeding."

So, the mission of The Society and its individual members is a way to advance all of us in holiness.

In 1915, the SVDP President-General Vicomte Hendecourt further developed the idea that "The Society has two aims:"

The first is "to do a great deal of spiritual good to its members through the exercise of charity." By helping others, we help ourselves. This is a wonderful example of how God has ordered the world so that we benefit ourselves by benefiting others.

The second is "to do a little spiritual and temporal good to a few poor families in the name of Jesus Christ." Jesus praised and even demanded charity when he said "For I was hungry, and you gave Me something to eat; I was thirsty, and you gave Me something to drink; I was a stranger, and you invited Me in ..." Matthew 25:35

These two principles complement each other. President Hendecourt's point is that there are plenty of agencies, public and private, that offer aid to the poor. The design of SVDP is different in that by adding the spiritual element we enhance the virtue of charity by raising it above simple materialism.

Mother Teresa says, "Holiness does not consist in doing extraordinary things. It consists in accepting, with a smile, what Jesus sends us. It consists in accepting and following the will of God." These holy Acts of Charity are delivered throughout the year by more than 40 St. Tim Vincentian volunteers (as well as the Knights of Columbus and the parish staff) who visit our neighbors, stock our pantry, organize coat drives, and help in the Call Center. The "holiness factor" is a great benefit and inspiration.

The increasing costs for food, fuel, utilities, and rent have made this year especially difficult for families struggling to make ends meet. We appreciate your generosity. You can be sure that your contributions are carefully managed to get the most out of each dollar.
