Worried about Our World? By Fr. Rick Bolte

There are certainly lots of problems in our world. The war in Ukraine is raging. The war is not going well for the Russians; could this lead to nuclear weapons? And there are other places where fighting continues: Syria, Yemen, Congo, Sudan, to name but a few. Other places leave us anxious about war: Korea, China-Taiwan, Iran, etc.

In our own country we have a political system that doesn't seem to work very well. Winning points for one's political party often seems more important than actually serving the people. Judicial decisions are announced on media with the annotation of which president appointed the judge(s) involved suggesting partisanship influencing the decision.

The list of troubles could go on and on. And I think the older we get, the more the past seems to have been better. Because we lived through it, it is now understandable and far less ominous than when we actually lived through it. We forget the anxiety of the cold war, the divisions in our country caused by the Vietnam War, and the crazy times of the sexual revolution, drug culture, and the crazy '60's. And young people can easily believe that these are the worst of times because they are for them — they've experienced none other.

I sincerely doubt that there has ever been (and maybe never will be) a time without cause of consternation and anxiety. Reflecting on Jesus' time we can see great problems then as well. Other than a 100-year stretch marred by civil war, Israel has been a conquered nation for over 500 years. In Jesus' time it was the Romans. They cared little for the Jewish people and were ruthless in suppressing any rebellion. There were the Jews and other foreigners living in the

country who colluded with the Romans; the Herodians and even the Sadducees who controlled the Temple. Politically and religiously the Jews were divided. Besides the Sadducees who were after power and wealth, the Pharisees were into scrupulous religiosity as a way to feel superior to others, there were the Essenes who lived in the desert because they gave up on all political and religious leadership, and the Zealots who were always on the lookout for rebellion. Most of the people worked hard just to stay alive.

It seems amazing that in the midst of all this, Jesus seems almost uninvolved. He has frequent conflicts with the Pharisees only as he challenges them and the people to get beyond the exterior appearance and be faithful in their hearts. Even when they try to trap him with political/religious questions, he avoids the trap and choosing sides (e.g. paying taxes with the Roman coin in Matthew 22:15-22). Instead Jesus continues to focus on how we personally treat others, recognizing our own need for forgiveness, daring to believe we are children of our Heavenly Father, and learning to love as Jesus demonstrates with his own life. Jesus' answer to the problems of the world was not to worry (consider the birds and flowers . . . Matthew 6:26-34) about what you don't control. We are called to be faithful with what we are given and trust in God's will.

There are some things we can do about our world. Prayer placing it all in God's hands has to top the list. Beyond that we should accept the privilege and responsibility to vote, give generously to help those in

St. Vincent de Paul has high standards for members – VERY, VERY high standards: Are you a CIA agent? PhD chemist? Nuclear engineer? (Mega-philanthropist would be wonderful!!!)

If you are, that's GREAT!!! You can be any (Or none) of those

things. What we really need is ... you!!

To qualify, you should be:

- ♦ A person with a little time to share. (But, not as much as you may think.)
- And someone with an interest in helping neighbors who are struggling a bit.

Jesus said, "Feed my sheep." That's what we do. We're sort of assistant shepherds.

- ◆ The most visible thing we do at St. Tim's is the Food Pantry in the basement. So, you can help collect food, contribute food, (of course, you can contribute money we never seem to have enough of that), organize the pantry, or deliver food to people who really need it.
- You can make phone calls to interview neighbors to see what they need.
- ◆ To the extent that our resources permit, we help people who are having problems paying their rent or utilities- or they just need a little gas money to get to work.
- We offer vouchers for our three thrift stores that offer furniture, clothing, housewares, and even medicine when it's available.
- We provide referral resources to help families help themselves

The other thing we do – really the most important thing – is to offer friend-ship, understanding, and prayer.

• Vincentians are prayerful people. We pray before and after meetings, with and for our neighbors, and we encourage a life of prayer and reflection, as a community of faith.

If SVDP seems like an outreach you might be interested in, we'd like to offer the opportunity to discuss SVDP. You can attend a meeting, or join an experienced Vincentian (like the disciples we ALWAYS visit in twos) on an actual call to see if this is a ministry you might want to commit to.

- ◆ It doesn't take a lot of time, about three hours a week, more or less, depending on your schedule. We share the work, so no one person has to do too much. If you have a career which gives you some free time, this may be a great fit for you.
- If you're retired, this may be an ideal way to serve the Lord, serve your neighbors, and gain a great sense of satisfaction.

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Outreach: Serving Others, Helping Ourselves

As the end of my second threeyear term as a member of the Outreach Committee comes to an end, I took some time to reflect on some of the service projects, friends made, and people I've met and served throughout these years.

When my son, Elijah, was born it became a priority for me to instill in him compassion and a desire to help those in need of anything really, from food and housing, to clothing and shoes. From donating and organizing baby items to spending time with the elderly who don't get many visitors, those are all things we have done since I joined the committee. When I was nominated the first time in 2016, he was 11 years old, and we had already served on several of the outreach projects here at St Tim's as well as through the Mann Ambassadors at Mann Elementary. I accepted the nomination without hesitation and was discerned to the committee.

I had no idea how many wonderful things the Outreach Committee did. There were so many projects and ways to be involved at the parish and out in the community. There are the continuing projects like Fr Ruschman's Garden of Gratitude, Mary Rose Mission, and St Vincent de Paul, to the grants that are awarded each year that include a special service project. Those were always amazing. I was shocked at the number of organizations throughout Northern KY that offers services of all types to all people in need, many with no questions asked and all with no judgements passed.

Some of my favorites are serving dinner and touring the Emergency Shelter of Northern KY. They serve dinner and offer shelter every night and did so in a small building on Scott St in Covington until they were fortunate enough to be able to move into a larger, new and much nicer space

across town. I also loved working at the Diocesan Children's Home. We did a few different things there. We decorated for Christmas a few times and were able to watch the kids perform in a circus type talent show and share pizza with them afterwards. They loved being able to show us all the tricks they'd been practicing. The smiles from their accomplishments were huge. Another time we cleaned up the grounds and playground and did some landscaping. We didn't get to see the kids that day, but we did see the therapy horses that are there and clean up the picnic area that they used for the family picnic.

Life Learning Center was another fun project that was two parts. The first day, we organized the clothes in their free store. Any client can go in and choose different clothing that they need, many needing clothing for job interviews. The second day we started taping and priming a room for painting that is now a Head Start preschool program in Covington. Our grant money was used to provide a coffee bar for their clients. They now have a safe, healthy environment to gather and have coffee, play board games and read books.

Many of you have helped with putting the grocery carts together for Be Concerned. They are a well-known organization here at St Tim's. Paul Gottbrath is such a great speaker that you can't help but want to be part of whatever they need. It's also a great way for the entire family to get involved. It's one of the first projects Elijah and I ever did when he was 6 years old.

Another great family friendly service was the macaroni and cheese packing we did for NKY Hunger Relief. That was such a fun day, and everyone had a great time. There were 77 volunteers of all ages helping, and we made over 23,000 meal packets.



My all-time favorite service project though was probably the Halloween pumpkin decorating that we did with the seniors living at Brighton Center's Saratoga Place Apartments in Newport. We went there and painted mini pumpkins with the residents, had some punch, cookies and candy. They absolutely loved having the kids there to decorate pumpkins with them for their apartments. Some of them don't have family in the area and don't get visitors on a regular basis. It made my heart smile to see them light up.

As you can see, if you've read this far, there are so many good things happening here. So many ways to be involved. So many friends to be made working alongside other parishioners. So many people to meet in the community. So many people that need a little help. So much "little" that goes such a long way to giving them a boost, helping them back up when they're down on their luck or just down in the dumps.

We all have different gifts that we can use to make a difference in the community, in the lives of others, but mostly in ourselves. Please reach out to Pat Seuberling if you feel like you are called to serve. We are always in need of people that want to help. The reward is huge in so many ways. Sometimes I feel overwhelmed, like I want to "save the world" or something and I realize that while that's not possible, it is possible to make a difference locally and help those in need. Mostly though, it helps me just as much. You really will get more out of it than you give. Trust me.




