Lenten Eucharistic Adoration By Fr. Rick Bolte

It's a common question, "What are we supposed to do for an hour of Adoration?" The simple answer is that it is time for prayer, but it doesn't have to be for an hour.

But how to pray. There is no one way to pray that fits everyone but it is important that we take time to pray. Prayer is a conversation with God and it is important that we take time to talk with God. We can say we believe in God, we believe God is all loving, God cares for each person, God always listens to us, God is always merciful, etc. These are all true but they are just words if we don't have a relationship with God. These good words can be rejected because we don't experience them or they can be hollow as we repeat them but they have little real meaning to us.

Like any relationship, we need to spend time together communicating. Talking while we are doing something else is good, but not best. With our loved ones we often talk as we work at something else. But for a serious conversation, we need to be able to put down what we're doing and give the other person our undivided attention. This is a big part of why Eucharistic Adoration is so valuable. We certainly can pray anywhere. But we all know that if we are surrounded by distractions, we won't stay focused on talking with God. Adoration has the added advantage of being in church, a place we know to be special as a place to encounter God. Further with the Eucharist on display in the monstrance, we have a very real sense of God's presence.

So, if we are in church for Adoration, what do we do? The answer has to begin with how you have any conversation. You talk about what is important to you. It's important to speak to God about the things we

believe are good and want to happen. It's good to express sorrow for our failings and shortcomings. We need to praise God for the many good things we have, experience, and see in others. It's important to be thankful as we call to mind the many things that are ours that were simply gifts from our God.

Like any good relationship, we have to be honest with God about how we feel. Sometimes we are sad, disappointed, and/ or angry. Even when those negative emotions are directed toward God, we must share them. Keeping them inside will just block any real communication and we're bound to get bored with just saying the "right" thing. It's OK that in our head we realize God's not at fault, we have to share what is in our hearts. That keeps the communication open so that we can come to understand what God does.

It is hard to stay focused for longer periods of time, like a whole hour. Many people will say the rosary and/or any number of beautifully written prayers. These can be very helpful when you are trying not to wander in your thoughts. It can be helpful to say prayers that you wish you could say with your whole heart even if at least for now you can't. The only danger with these beautiful prayers is if we allow them to take the place of speaking honestly from our hearts. That's the heart of our communication and relationship.

Learning to listen is often the hardest part of prayer. We can talk a lot by sharing our thoughts, feelings, hopes, etc. We can say a lot of beautiful prayers. But to hear God speak to us we also need to learn to be quiet. Perhaps the greatest form of

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prayer is to simply be able to sit quietly in God's presence. Like those special times with another person we love, sometimes it is just beyond words the joy of simply being together. These are the times God speaks most clearly to us. God speaks to the depths of our hearts. The more we can quietly be in tune with his presence and allow ourselves to be present without words, the more we can hear God speak.

We all know Lent is a time for doing penance. The goal of penance isn't to see what difficult thing we can do or give up. In that we are trying to earn the gift God already offers us. Lent is a time to become closer with God. This can be done by giving up simple things that bring to mind our desire to be closer with God. But choosing to spend some time in Eucharistic Adoration may be an even better choice. As Lent begins, consider spending some time in Christ's presence. Talk with him in a way that works for you. Seek and even dare to ask for those special moments where sitting in his presence fills your heart with joy and love!

Be Bold, Be Catholic

It's awfully easy as Catholic today to feel discouraged with what is going on in the world and with the Church. We're under withering attack and it seems there's no end in sight. Now is not the time to back away from the attacks of the devil but instead to trust in the Lord. He's promised he would never abandon us and he's true to his word.

One of my favorite Gospel passages is the 16th chapter in the Gospel of Matthew and that familiar exchange between Jesus and his disciples. He asked them "Who do people say I am?" and they answer with Jeremiah, John the Baptist and Elijah. It was an easy answer since they were just repeating what they had heard from others. But then Jesus, as he so often does, turns the question back on them and asks, "But who do you say I am?" Peter's answer acknowledges Jesus as the Messiah, the Son of the Living God at which Jesus identifies Peter as the rock on which he would build his Church.

That question of "Who do you say I am?" is the one that should hit all of us. At the core of our Catholic identity is the answer to that question. If we are proclaiming who he is as Peter did, then our life is owed entirely to Jesus. All of what we can become and will ever be is because of the gifts given to us and the grace and mercy of the living God. That means that God must be first in our life and if we put him first, we don't have anything to worry about.

Here at the parish, we have more than 30 people in the process of coming into the Church. Despite the negativity around the Catholic Church, people are still coming, and they will keep coming. We have truth, beauty and goodness on our side and there are many people today who are looking for that very thing. We have within us the innate need to know the Creator and it is through our Catholic faith that will

happen. I am so impressed by the enthusiasm and the questions that we get at each class. Our approach is to follow Jesus first and then the teachings of the Church are organic to that desire. We're not shy about it, he is the Christ, the Son of the Living God and we are proud to profess it.

In my experience at St. Anne Retreat Center, I see people coming back to the faith who have been away for a long time. I see people energized and renewed in their commitment to what the Church teaches. Our Catholic Café on Monday mornings with Father Cleves has grown from a handful of people to 25 or more who show up each week. People are hungry for the truth and Good News of the Gospel. Our women's retreat in February sold out and we see more and more people coming on retreat. They need it and they want to have their Catholic faith be an integral part of their life.

Don't let the devil win, be Catholic and be true to your faith. Walk with the Lord in these trying times and he'll walk with you. Trust that God is in control of things and not the world and especially not social media. It's a poison environment and we need to keep tighter reigns on what we expose ourselves to as well as our children. To stand for the dignity of all human life is not popular today. That's a shame because that's what the Gospels teach us, that every human life matters from natural conception to natural death. Life matters and character counts, the character that comes from being a follower of Jesus Christ and Holy Catholic Church. Be bold, be Catholic and be assured that Lord will be with you.



PSR Registration Is Right Around The Corner

Registration for 2019-2020 PSR classes for continuing education and Sacrament Prep will begin on Sunday, March 24. Plans are well underway for another successful year. Please register early so we can be sure to reserve rooms accordingly. Thanks.

Registration forms will be sent home through PSR classes, available on the St. Timothy web site, the Facebook page, and mailed to all incoming first grade, seventh grade, and Catholic school or Home School students that will be in second and eighth grades.

Sacrament Preparation Programs:

First Reconciliation & Communion

- * Students in public schools preparing for the Sacraments of First Reconciliation and First Communion must have a year of religious education prior to the year the sacraments are received. So, students must attend in 1st grade to receive the Sacraments in second grade.
- * Catholic school and Catholic Home School students must register in the PSR program for their second grade year so they can attend the retreats and sacrament celebrations.

Confirmation

- * Students in public schools must attend PSR through the year of seventh grade, and complete the required service hours and participate in Mass activities. Confirmation happens in the eighth grade year, in January. Students must attend PSR up to the confirmation date, completing service hours, and a Saint report and attending the required events; Agency Service Day, Rosary Prayer, Sponsor Night, Christmas Giving Fair, Confirmation Retreat, and rehearsal.
- * Catholic school and Catholic Home School students must register in the PSR program for the Confirmation year. They will attend classes at St. Timothy and complete service hours, a Saint report and attend the required events listed above.

Continuing Education Classes - 3rd through 6th grade

* Between the Sacrament years our religious program strengthens our students' faith knowledge focusing on the Mass, Ten Commandments, Sacraments and the Covenants. These are great years to include your children in so they are ready in their 7th grade year to begin an in-depth look at Jesus's life, and prepare to confirm their faith.


There is a place for everyone who is interested in being a part of the Catholic Education of our Youth. Join our team and help shape the future.

Catechist - Responsible for instruction and conducting classes throughout the school year. Lesson plans, including activities are provided to create a framework and guide for teaching. 



Holiday Magic

While the economy continues to churn along (in fits and starts) generating jobs and increased income for some, but for those whose health has failed them, accident victims, seniors on fixed incomes, single parents raising a family alone, the disabled and veterans in need, there isn't much sparkle for them during the holidays until they become angels on our tree and get selected for special treatment. The Spirit of Christmas beats brightly in your hearts and can be seen (and felt) in the Gathering Space and in Brodnick Hall. Oh, those Christmas sacks filled with warm new clothes, toys and games and scooters, skateboards and bicycles. Sometimes when I look over the bounty of gifts I reminisce of my younger years when I was all aglow visiting the toy stores and hoping Santa would bring me a Schwinn Bicycle. The Holiday season was an unqualified success because you provided presents for 70 families and 50 Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners (plus many extras), almost twice the number of families we supported as last year!

Like the multiplication of the loaves and fishes, we not only fed the bodies, we were also successful at feeding the soul with help from above. One of our families accepted our invitation to attend Mass and were impressed enough with their celebration to go back and encourage other family members to join them for their next visit and are looking forward to joining our MOPS group

On another visit, several months ago, a client asked for a bible to help her on her journey. We gave her one of our beautifully covered CHRP Bibles which she began using for her daily devotions. She had been living at the Stay Lodge for several years struggling with alcoholism. She started attending AA meetings and is now clean and sober for six months and is sponsoring others and praises the Lord daily for her graces and blessings.

Christmas eve one of our Vincentians happened to be at St Paul's when a homeless family, living in a truck, asked for food and shelter having no money for the Inn. Thanks to your continuing generosity we were able to accommodate them at the Stay Lodge, provide food and social service counselling until their SSI check was received.

One of the areas of greatest need is housewares (pots, pans, dishware and small appliances). Often the thrift stores are depleted and our families often have nothing to prepare or consume dinner. With the cost of hotel stays rising everyone is looking to find a place of their own. We currently have six families who are in various stages of relocating and are in need of basic furniture and

housewares. Relocation is one of those "ah-ha" moments when families are finally able to break the cycle and find a place of their own. Living in a hotel/extended stay paying \$300/\$400 a week on a \$15/hr salary is like sinking in quick sand from which you can't extricate yourself without financial aid and material and spiritual support.

We can't say enough about the support (time, talent and treasure) provided by our parishioners. Your gifts of coats, food vouchers, clothing, furniture, bicycles and housewares have materially supported our neighbors. In addition, parishioners have helped by delivering food, presents and goods, sorting clothes and food donations and assisting in so many ways. Your financial support has been amazing, always seeming to arrive just when we need it most! Then to when we see "little miracles" occur, we know that our "joint" prayers are being answered from above.

There is really only one thing we desperately need: a few more dedicated Vincentians who have a heart for their neighbors in need and see the face of God in those they visit. Have/are you being called by the Spirit to bring glad tidings to the poor? We will happily schedule you to accompany us on a call or two and get a feel for what we do and the rewards we reap when we reach out to those who seek our help.

Recently on the Feast of St. Timothy, Father Ross spoke in his homily at the 4:30 Mass about our journey as "co-parishioners" as part of the St. Timothy family.

My journey at St. Timothy and at Mary Rose Mission began almost at the same time.

Six years ago in the early fall after relocating to NKY and Union, my husband, Tom and I joined St. Timothy Parish. Just a week or two later, Cindy Carris, the President of MRM received one of our grants, and spoke about Mary Rose Mission and the need for volunteers.

I started volunteering at Mary Rose Mission, which at the time had only been open for about six months and was open for meals on Saturday and Sunday evenings. I soon discovered that St. Tim's had committed to providing a meal one Sunday a month.

Fast forward six years later, Tom and I feel very blessed to be a part of the St. Tim's family. We both volunteer at MRM and I have been a member of the Outreach Committee for several years. We, at St. Tim's, continue to provide the meal, on the fourth Sunday of each month. The Mission is now open seven days a week and will celebrate it's sixth year in March.

The motto at Mary Rose Mission is "To Love as God Loves". Some of our guests come to MRM to help

stretch their food budget and for the sense of community. For many others it may be the only food that they have that day. They are the homeless or the transiently homeless, living on the street or in their cars. All are welcomed with smiles, hugs and are our valued guests. "We are so glad you are here." It is a place of warmth and love, where all are treated with dignity and respect.

Through this Outreach Ministry, I have had the pleasure of getting to know fellow parishioners that I may not have otherwise met. I have volunteered with Paul and the Youth Group, the MOPS Group, St. Tim families volunteering with their older children, as well as groups of our regular volunteers. Even after five years, I still meet parishioners I have not met before.

The guests love our meal, and often remember and thank St. Timothy's in their prayer intentions. They pray for us, and we pray for them. We feel very blessed that God has lead us to St. Timothy's and to Mary Rose Mission.


