# A Parish Growing in Faith

There are lots of ways to measure the growth of a parish. We could measure how many people or families are registered in the parish, how many attend Mass on weekends, how many contribute financially or how many volunteer. Those are the external and measurable attributes of a parish. But none of these measure faith.

Faith, by definition involves believing/ trusting without guarantees. It is trusting in God's promises as we move into the unknown. And maybe most difficult of all, it is realizing that we are not the center of what is important. Trusting in God challenges us to realize we neither have all the answer nor do we have control of the outcome. We live our faith not because we know the destination of our life's journey as much as we learn to enjoy the journey. We are called to live in the present, discerning as best we can what is the best course of action, while at the same time not being too attached as we could be wrong. Faith is trusting in God beyond where we can remain comfortably safe and in charge.

Faith then requires confidence. As babies and toddlers we almost innately trust our parents and caregivers. Soon in life our parents are pushing us to try new things. They assure us we can do it and of course keep us safe. With family, teacher, coach, etc. encouragement we begin to have confidence in ourselves and our abilities. We learn to face the unknown for ourselves.

We are tugged to go beyond our being the center of what we are about when we learn to love. When mom, dad, and others do things for us and we are able to recognize them as gifts, we know something of love. When we love in return, we are a bit less focused on ourselves. We can be selfish in relationships and even in marriages, but our heart's desire is to allow ourselves to be loved. We can't trust selfless love unless we ourselves try to love selflessly. The marriage or true friendship becomes the locus of our attention and we venture into the unknown of this relationship now with confidence in each other.

We don't know where even our closest relationships will go. Marriage and any commitment to family and friends is to venture into the unknown. We have ideas about what we are getting into but we really don't know. We are challenged by the reality of our lives to surrender to the uncertainty. At any given moment we can choose the best course of action we can think of, but we are called to humbly realize that another, spouse or friend, may have a different course of action. As much as we want to make the best choices, ultimately it comes down to deciding together and walking the journey forward into the unknown together. Marriages and close friendships are about that journey, having faith in each other and venturing into the unknown.

Hopefully we come to know God on this journey. To know God is not the same as knowing about God. We begin to encounter God when we walk the journey of life coming to know the goodness in ourselves and those we are close to. We encounter God when things don't go as we planned but we realize a greater gift than we knew was possible comes our way. We can recognize God even in the hard times when we are forced to surrender our control and see the good God does when we let go. This greater

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encounter with God is why we are drawn to a larger community of people with similar experiences of God; we seek to be church experienced locally as a parish. We seek an ever fuller encounter with God.

We grow in faith then, not by what is measurable on the outside but because of the shared reality, the encounter with the divine. True faith is not about everyone agreeing, all problems being solved, and lots of people doing all kinds of impressive things. Just as alone and with close relationships, it is about walking the journey; so too a parish. We move forward without certainty but learning to trust each other. We journey knowing that even when things go wrong according to our plan, we trust God has a bigger plan. The God we have encountered alone or with an-

other is the same God who is with us as his family, our parish. When we work together as a parish, even when we don't meet these external measurements, we are growing in faith. As we have come to see God's presence in ourselves and others close to us, we dare to believe in God's presence within a community of believers. It calls for a greater surrender, greater trust; we grow in faith in God.

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# What is the ScienceTechnologyElectronicsArtMath Lab or Makerspace in our new school?

You may have heard it or seen it on the display and wondered. Here's the answer. Makerspaces and STEAM labs are popping up in schools across the country. Makerspaces provide hands-on, creative ways to encourage students to design, experiment, build and invent as they deeply engage in science, engineering and tinkering.

A makerspace is not solely a science lab, woodshop, computer lab or art room, but it may contain elements found in all of these familiar spaces. Therefore, it must be designed to accommodate a wide range of activities, tools and materials. Diversity and cross-pollination of activities are critical to the design, making and exploration process, and they are what set makerspaces and STEAM labs apart from single-use spaces. A possible range of activities might include:

- Cardboard construction
- Prototyping
- Woodworking
- Electronics

- Robotics
- Digital fabrication
- •Building bicycles and kinetic machines
- Textiles and sewing

Designing a space to accommodate such a wide range of activities is a challenging process. Educators and administrators can help guide the process and generate the space that works best by researching, brainstorming and clearly articulating their needs, while keeping in mind inevitable changes in the future.

Our STEAM Lab is the size of two regular classrooms. We will additionally have a **Science Lab**. This room is the size of one and a half classrooms, will include extra sinks and a dishwasher. It will allow students to work with the elements of nature which can be too messy for the STEAM Lab.

On August 1, Bishop Roger Foys appointed me to serve as Director of the St. Anne Retreat Center in Melbourne Ky. The Diocese purchased the facility from the Congregation of Divine Providence in 2013 and has continued to operate it as a retreat center. St. Anne is now the only retreat center in the Diocese since the sale of the Marydale property.

When Bishop Foys and I discussed the position, I expressed my desire to turn St. Anne into more than just a retreat center. While retreats are an important part of our spiritual development, I want to see this beautiful property utilized for more than that. It sits on eighteen beautiful acres with a hundred-acre nature conservancy behind the property. Hiking trails go through the property and the conservancy and provide a great place to get away from it all.

The vision I put forth is to have a place to gather as Catholics and share in our faith in a way that's different than what we are experiencing today. I want to have local Catholic artist display their work in an art show, have Catholic poets share their work and writers to do the same. Catholic music festivals and wine tastings are a part of the vision as well. We have three vineyards just a few miles from the property. I want to bring great Catholic speakers and host special events that help us to re-engage in the great Catholic culture too many have forgotten. Lectures on the works of St. John of the Cross or St. Augustine, reflections on St. Catherine of Sienna and St. Therese can be a part of it. Can you imagine a Friday evening on the grounds with a glass of wine and a wonderful speaker or musician sharing their talents? That's the vision I have for the facility.

New retreats will be an important part as well. Retreats featuring Igna-

tian Spirituality and silent retreats are going to become a reality. Bringing in nationally renowned speakers to lead retreats will be done as well. My objective is to make St. Anne the premier retreat center in the Midwest, a place for spiritual renewal and celebration of our Catholic faith.

Bishop Foys supports my ideas and has been very supportive in my early efforts. I'm really just getting up to speed on the staff and how the





retreats work. I'm extremely blessed to have an incredible team of people dedicated to bringing the best they can to the facility. My Assistant Director, Karen Little has been an extraordinary help in the transition and is indispensable in my efforts. These people have a true love of St. Anne and want the same that I want, a great place to come and grow in your relationship with Jesus Christ.

As we speak, part of my work is developing a strategic plan for the future than includes improvements to the facility's infrastructure. I'm also working to increase the staff since we

do need more people to work there. If you have an interest or know someone who may be looking for a great place to work, let me know. We need hospitality ministers, house-keeping and kitchen help. If you have a teenager looking for a job, we would be good place for them to be. We can provide a safe and wonderful environment for young people.

We have two beautiful chapels on the grounds. They are such a blessing and places of great peace and tranquility. You can't help but feel God's presence when you walk into them. The Sacred Heart Chapel has been recently renovated with the Tabernacle being moved back in the center where it belongs. The Mary, Mother of Mercy Chapel is new and it too is beautiful.

I would like to invite you to come out and tour the center. I'm there Monday through Friday and some Saturdays. The facility is open to the public 8:00 to 4:00 but we do ask that you let us know if you're coming. You can call the center at (859) 441-2003 or my cell phone at (859) 630-9147.

Some of you have asked me if this assignment means I'm leaving St. Timothy. The answer is no. St. Anne is my full time job but St. Timothy is my deacon assignment. That doesn't mean I can't be moved as any deacon can be moved at any time by the Bishop. The St. Anne assignment doesn't change that. Keep me in your prayers that I may do the job I've been called to do. The Lord has been so good to me and every morning when I pull into that driveway at St. Anne, I thank him for this blessing. Come out and see St. Anne Retreat Center and you'll know why I feel this way.



Those of us who were fortunate enough to see Brodnick Hall 1 when it was overflowing with Christmas gifts last year, were blessed to see the spirit of St Timothy's generosity lived out. The many volunteers were touched by the sincerity of our parishioners to help others experience the joy that Christmas brings. How difficult it is for parents who can not buy their children the one gift they really want or the sheets and comforter to go on the bed they were just given. Through you, God is working to take care of His people.

Some of the families we sponsor come from the long standing relationship we have with the folks at Gallatin County Community Action Center. Many of the families live in poor rural areas in the county. Each of the families we sponsor completes a special program to be able to participate in the Christmas Giving Tree. They have to complete 12 hours of class time that include parenting classes, library time reading with

their children, health and nutrition class, budget/credit class and GED education if needed. The families also participate in service hours to give back to their community. They work hard in the program so they are able to provide Christmas gifts to their children. The CAC wants to help families grow by increasing the expectations of the families and showing their faith and belief in them. The look on the parent's face when they see a bike for their child or their car overflowing with gifts is priceless.

Some of the other families we help are parishioners who have found themselves in difficult situations including grandparents raising grandchildren, families with overwhelming medical bills, and victims of domestic violence. A few gifts for a child "saves Christmas" as one parent put it. Those gifts help the parent see that there are kind and generous people in the world, helping the families experience God's

never ending care and love for them. Thank you for allowing God to work through you.

Lastly, the parish assists St. Vincent de Paul in providing gifts to the families they are working with. These folks live within our parish boundaries and are struggling to meet the basic needs of their families (shelter, food, utilities). There is not much left at the end to purchase a Christmas gift.

We could use some more help with the Christmas collection. I know we are all extra busy during the Holidays, but there are lots of little jobs that need to be done and I promise your Christmas will have more meaning when you reach out to those in need.

### Family Promise Touches Lives of Some of the Most Vulnerable: Our Children

Family Promise provides the basics to some local families who are homeless-a place to stay, food, transportation, employment services, child care and housing assistance. But perhaps more importantly than that is the love the children and families are shown through the volunteers. Below is a reflection from a parishioner who volunteered during our first week of hosting.

On Friday, July 29 I went to spend some time with the family staying at St. Agnes with the Family Promise organization. Family Promise, for those of you that don't know, is a great organization that works with homeless families to help get them back into permanent housing, find jobs and get training with skills they can use everyday. They are unique in that they keep the entire family unit together. The adults must go through background checks and submit to drug testing before they can be placed in the program. Once in the program, local churches take weekly blocks to prepare meals, provide shuttle transportation to and from the Family Promise day center in Newport to the church where the families are staying overnight, and to "hang out" with the families and stay with them overnight. I was asked to stop in and spend some time with the families during the week that St Timothy was "hosting". I had done the training and had a general idea of the rules and regulations the families are expected to follow while in the program, but other than that I didn't really know what to expect when I arrived at St. Agnes on Friday evening. I have to say, it was a great time. There was only one family in the program this particular week. It was a young couple that had recently gotten married and shortly thereafter had been granted custody of their 2 nieces and 2 nephews between the ages of 4 and 10. Dinner had been provided by Chuy's and we all sat down to some excellent fajitas, rice and beans, chips, salsa, guacamole and there were chicken fingers and mac-n-cheese for the kids. After dinner we cleaned up and played with the kids for awhile until the girls had to go up to get ready for bed. The couple talked about how Family Promise was helping them to find permanent housing and both of them had gotten full time jobs. The kids told us about how they weren't looking forward to starting back to school and how they had been given tickets to a Red's game earlier that week that they enjoyed very much. I left that evening feeling very happy that I had the opportunity to spend some time there getting to know the family that St Timothy was helping. Family Promise is a great organization and it is a wonderful opportunity for your entire family to be involved helping those in the community that need our support. St. Timothy is hosting again the week of October 9-15 so if you're interested in helping out please contact Katy Sullivan in the Parish Office to find out more information.

## Falling....Behind By Bill Anderson

Summer's heat is finally subsiding as the kids head back to school, but for many of our neighbors the long, hot summer drags on. While there may seem to be jobs for the taking, there are businesses with jobs opening and closing, single parent families, people out of work and seniors and the disabled living on fixed (substandard) incomes. As a point In fact, a number of our families have struggled with large rent/mortgage and utilities payments. Lack of transportation (loss of a vehicle) intensifies the problems of finding a job and reporting to work on time as well as accessing resources that can support them. These are just a sampling of the many obstacles our neighbors face daily.

On the plus side, with your support and the help of some kindred agencies we've been able to keep our pantry and refrigerator well stocked to provide nutritious meals for our families and children. In addition, our monthly benefactors have allowed us to expand our reach and provide additional assistance to those who are working to develop their independence. We still could use some additional support to reach our goal of 25 families providing regular monthly support. We can also use a couple of key food items for the pantry: rice, spaghetti sauce, box dinners, meat (canned chicken, tuna, ham, etc), creamed and specialty soups, chili, stew, shampoo.

It never ceases to amaze us, the resiliency of our neighbors and how they overcome disabilities, illness, job loss, reduced or missed benefit payments, car problems and a myriad of other challenges. We have clients without cars who start their day at 5 AM to catch a bus and don't return home until 7:00 PM. Veterans who are not getting the care and benefits they are entitled to. It seems that single mothers rarely receive child support and struggle to find good paying jobs and affordable child care. We've recently made connections with NK/ADD (Northern KY Aging and Disability Network) to assist our senior citizens and address their special needs. While you may worry about people receiving government support who don't deserve it, what we see more often, are those who can't work waiting months or years for approval of benefits or to obtain Section 8 housing vouchers and then not being able to find apartments that will accept them. Even with Food Stamps (and other government subsidies), there are frequent changes in benefits which leave neighbors with reduced coverage or without coverage for extended periods of time.

All that we accomplish is done with the Grace of God, your hopes and prayers and your donations of food, clothing, housewares and money. When we light the way for our families, you power the batteries that keep the light shining. We recently celebrated our first anniversary and over the last year we have added new members (and look forward to adding more) and accomplished some impressive results: Visiting over 200 neighbors, assisting over 600 dependents (single moms, children, vets, seniors, etc), providing over 500 bags of groceries, covering rent/mortgage payments totaling over \$7500, utilities exceeding \$6000, vouchers (food, clothing, housewares) totaling \$5000. Outreach only provides \$6000 a year, so it is your monthly support which allows us to continue to expand our reach and support those in need.

We've come a long way in our first year! Pete Freeman has guided us spiritually and prayerfully through the many challenges of travelling, training, stocking our pantry, supporting our neighbors, working with other agencies and Katy Sullivan and the dedicated parishioners here at St. Tim's have volunteered their time, talent and resources to insure our success. Thank you for your commitment, prayers and generosity.


