SURRENDER! By Fr. Rick Bolte

"Paul, a slave of Christ Jesus" (Rom 1:1); so Paul describes himself. He is not speaking of Christ physically or mentally overpowering him. He is speaking of a choice he has made to surrender to Christ.

To surrender to Christ, we first have to recognize that there is a difference between our will and God's. As much as that would seem self-evident, there are times we are so sure that what we believe is right, that we are sure God must be on our side. It is hard to imitate the humility of Thomas Merton, "the fact that I think that I am following your will does not mean that I am actually doing so."

There are times when the good just seems so obvious. We pray for the health and life of those we love, those whose families would be devastated without them, and those who seem to be exceptionally good people. We pray for things it seems our world definitely needs; an end to poverty, war, the pandemic, etc. We try to add, "not our will but your will be done." We want to imitate Christ's surrender to the will of his Father in the garden of Gethsemane.

Paul's slavery to Christ, like Jesus' surrender to the Father's will, is more than acceptance that even when we pray, things may not go our way. A big part has to be letting go of control; to trust to God's will what the outcome will be. Trust in God and so turning our lives over to Him wouldn't be so tough if it came with guarantees. If we knew our health, a comfortable living by our standards, success in our endeavors, good and happy children, good relationships, and the like were all sure to work out for us; we might try. But God doesn't guarantee things will go as we expect, so trust is hard.

To trust God, we need to know Him. To know God intimately is not knowledge about a God up in the heavens somewhere but an experience of God in the depths of our being. There is a goodness that we touch. It is beyond us yet a part of us. In a very real way it is part of our true self, the self our hearts long for. This is the intimacy with God that allows us to truly know God and to surrender to him.

To trust in God is to trust in the goodness we know in our hearts. It's to affirm that Goodness (Godness) reflecting the image and likeness of God within us. We love that goodness and when we are conscious of it, we want to choose it. We can come to prize this goodness above all else. We need silence in the presence of the Lord to be attentive to our heart's desire. We need to be in touch with that presence and to fall in love with what we know is so good. We gradually realize it is a goodness greater than any other.

But we still have to choose it. It will seem to be in competition with the "reality" of our lives. We still have our work, families, households, friends, and so many other things that are good and important. We can't be asked to ignore the necessities of living. Truth is we can't enter a day without some plan of action. There are things we should do, have to do, want to do, and/or plan to avoid. Without thinking, we plan our day on some basic level.

In the Our Father, we pray for God's will to be done here on earth. We also pray, "Give us this day our daily bread." We are not asking for our physical necessities to be provided. We are asking to be given this

day what we need to be about God's will. This is where the awareness becomes a choice. With a mindfulness of the goodness of God's presence within us, we ask that we may recognize the opportunities God gives us today to say yes to the goodness in our hearts. Things that are obstacles to our plans for the day can become occasions to choose the goodness deep within us. The person we find uncooperative, slow, or unaware changes from the person we get angry with to one we may minister to. The frustration of long lines at stores, crowded traffic, and

anytime things take longer than we want to wait become opportunities to be kind and concerned for others.

God doesn't ask us to opt out of the world. Rather, to surrender to the goodness of his presence within us. We don't stop living in the "real" world, we just surrender to a greater good than what we often pursue. Instead of being all about what we want to accomplish, we choose to be the person God created us to be. We become, by our daily "yes" to God, the very compassionate person we want to be. Our surrender is our salvation even now.



St. Timothy's council of Knights of Columbus has committed to contributing \$10,000 toward the expansion of St. Timothy School. The Knights Grand Knight Mark Sippel presented the first payment of \$5,000 to Fr. Botle to show the council's continued commitment to the growth and success of both St. Timothy school and the parish. This council of the KofC is made up solely of St. Timothy men with the steadfast support of their wives

committed to the betterment and growth of St. Timothy parish, the Dioceses of Covington and the Catholic Church worldwide. In addition to this first \$5k payment, the council is committed to donating an additional \$1,000 a year for the next 5 years to complete the \$10,000 donation. Outreach Has Been Busy!

November

In conjunction with SVdP and Knights of Columbus, we collected food items for Thanksgiving and Christmas meal bags and coats for Area people in need. In addition to collecting coats, the Knights purchased new coats, hats and gloves for the **177 children**. Thank you to the many volunteers and groups who helped with these 2 projects. The youth group helped pack bags for **65 families**. Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts and American Heritage Girls helped with stapling item lists and passing out the bags, and collection of food items.















December

Outreach saw Santa's workshop in full force. We were able to help **55** families with **178** children, aged 3 months to 17 years old, have a Christmas. **15** families were from Gallatin County and the rest were from our Florence area. Parishioners donated **27** bikes, **2** electric scooters, a basketball hoop, Ipads, and a mountain of toys and clothes for every child. Each child received, shirt, pants, shoes, coat, hats, gloves and **3** wish list items. Many parishioners gave extra. These items were given to the Western Kentucky area tornado victims. In addition, **\$450** of Kroger gift cards were given to St. Timothy School who held a collection to purchase diapers for those that lost so much. St. Timothy is blessed beyond belief by the generosity of our parishioners. **YOU are ROCK STARS!**







<u>January</u>

January was for feeding those who have no homes. We fulfilled **2** service projects for recipients of our grants. We packed 70 meal bags with sandwiches, soup, fruit cups, yogurt and cheese sticks, granola, hard candies and more. On a very cold night, these were delivered to the evening guests at NKY Emergency Shelter. They were grateful for the sustenance and the caring of our parish.

In addition, **77** volunteers packed **23,112** family mac-packs to be distributed to **6+** food pantries in NKY for NKY Hunger Relief.









Of course, every month we also prep and serve meals for the guests of **Mary Rose Mission**.

There are truly angels among us! We are a parish that cares and shares. I am blessed be able to work with each of you. Thank you to everyone who has helped with every one of these projects!
